

## Women, Sex and the Church: A Case for Catholic Teaching

### About the Contributors

**Erika Bachiochi** holds a J.D. from Boston University School of Law (2002) and a M.A. in Theology from Boston College (1999) where she was a Bradley Fellow at the Institute for the Study of Religion and Politics. She obtained her undergraduate degree *magna cum laude* at Middlebury College (1997) where she majored in Political Science, minored in Sociology (and took enough credits to fulfill a minor in Women's Studies).
